The latest Newark Castle BPI Project took place at the Nottinghamshire Wildlife Nature Reserve at Besthorpe, Newark on Thursday the 8th October 2015.

The task was to fund, supply and install a new vehicle and radar access gate suitable for wheelchair use and some additional fencing. Newark Castle Rotary Club used their business contacts to link with Towergate Insurance the UK's leading independently owned Insurance Intermediary to take on the installation and funding of the new gate way.

Towergate's Sales Director Kenny Robinson and a team of five colleagues worked tirelessly to

remove the existing timber posts and install the new metal radar gate system all within the day giving safe and secure access to wheelchair users to the nature reserve for the first time.

The Towergate team were delighted with the positive outcome and the opportunity to contribute to a local community project. All the team went home tired and weary but with the satisfaction that all their hard work will enable many wheelchair users to access and enjoy this wonderful nature reserve. Towergate hope that they will be able to support other Rotary projects in the future and that this will encourage other companies to take part in similar schemes.

Sensory delight provided for Sheffield pupils



A beautiful garden has been recreated for pupils at a Sheffield school to spend time in and enjoy.

Volunteers from Abbeydale Rotary Club spent Saturday mornings over a year working on the overgrown area used by Mossbrook Special School pupils and have just handed over the completed sensory garden to the school. Initial work involved clearing and tidying the whole area, before painting and planting of bulbs and plants could take place to create the haven.

The garden design represents the sun with its rays against a blue sky background, explained Phil Haywood, chair of Abbeydale Rotary's environmental committee. Plants introduced to the scheme were chosen for their beauty and strong scents, so included lavender, sage, lemon balm and winter pansies; they were paid for by Innerwheel Club members and paint was provided free of charge by Cromadex AkzoNobel.

Deputy headteacher of Mossbrook Special School Jessica Brooks said: "The garden is a place to explore for pupils, to touch and to smell, and a really lovely sensory experience with pathways wending their way between the plants. She added: "We're grateful to the Rotary club who have been involved with the school for some time and helped us previously to create a sensory room, which is now our next project for renovation."

Rotary Standing Shoulder to Shoulder with the Royal British Legion

In 2010 there was a crisis in the Nottingham City branch of the Royal British Legion when the elderly Poppy Appeal organiser suffered a stroke. The Lord Mayor had a meeting with Val Leivers, who was District Governor at the time, to ask if local Rotarians would help out. The assistance of clubs in Central and Trent groups was sought and they willingly took part with Val as the co-ordinator resulting in a record amount collected in the centre of Nottingham. Most of the Royal British Legion members are now physically unable to collect so the Rotary District 1220 involvement has continued and increased each year. In 2013 Val was successful in having the RBL Poppy Appeal designated as a recognised Rotary project by RGBI and now she receives calls for help from RBL branches all over the UK when they need our help. Their local Rotary District Community Coordinator is given the details and they take over from this point.

Initially we just helped in Nottingham but it became apparent that many clubs in District 1220 had been helping their local RBL branch with the Poppy Appeal for some time, something that we did not know as they quietly went about their task. Our clubs in Derbyshire are also very active with the RBL and DG Roger Summers has co-ordinated help in this area in previous years. The profile of Rotary is greatly increased when the public see us in our tabards helping this excellent cause and a number of new members have been recruited as a result. In the centre of Nottingham the collection was less than £5,000 in 2009 before Rotary became involved and by 2013 this had increased to £38,500. Last year it was in excess of an incredible £100,000 and in the last 4 years over £300,000 has been collected in the centre of Nottingham with our help!





At the time of writing we are in full swing with the 2015 Poppy Appeal and we all know how difficult it is organising our Christmas sleigh rota so just imagine trying to fill 480 slots in a two week period! As well as Rotarians and their families Val recruits help from friends, Inner Wheel, groups from various religions, the Ghurkhas, students and other organisations. This has now become a well oiled machine thanks to the support, dedication and good time keeping by everyone involved. District Governor Roger spent an interesting morning walking around the city centre in Nottingham with the Lord Mayor and another with the Sheriff.

UNRISE

The Royal British Legion nationally recognises and values our help very highly and Val and her team, under the leadership of Rotarian Elaine Hopkins the Nottinghamshire RBL Community Fundraiser, are confident of another good collection this year.

As a result the RBL selected Val and another volunteer from Immingham to spend a morning in Buckingham Palace taking the poppies for the Royal family and household. Unfortunately the Queen was occupied with the State visit of the President of China who was staying in the Palace so they were not able to meet!

We were delighted and surprised to be invited as guests to the Royal Albert Hall Festival of Remembrance on 7 November in the presence of the Queen and this is to recognise the part that Rotarians, not only in District 1220 but across RGBI, are playing and giving tremendous community service.

There are amazing stories related to collectors by members of the public and this is a fine example of Rotarians giving service to the community working shoulder to shoulder with the Royal British Legion.

President Eileen Murphy and John Scotney of the Rotary Club of Belper and Duffield spent a couple of weeks in July visiting nine local primary schools to hand over sets of illustrated dictionaries to be used by pupils in years 5 and 6.

These Dictionaries4Life are specially printed each year for Rotary in the UK to be distributed to primary schools for presentation to those pupils in year 6 who are leaving to go to their next school. When the Club approached the heads of the Belper schools last year about donating the dictionaries, the schools were all in agreement that they preferred to keep the books in school for use by successive classes of pupils. This decision has allowed the club to extend the scheme this year to many more local schools.

Next year will be the tenth year of the national project and over that period Rotarians have donated some 700,000 dictionaries to children at home and abroad.



The Rotary Club of Doncaster St Leger has made the club's annual contribution to the Dictionary4Life project, which helps to promote literacy, by donating copies of the Usborne Illustrated Dictionary to local schools.

One of the schools visited this year by the club's President, Jack Cusworth, was his old school - Pheasant Bank Academy in Rossington - where he presented dictionaries on Friday, 10th July during their Celebration Assembly. Jack (a retired head teacher) spoke to the children about the project and the value/use of dictionaries.

By using dictionaries efficiently children explore spellings, meanings and derivations for example by using alphabetical order, abbreviations and definitions with understanding. One of the most positive aspects of being able to use a dictionary is that it helps to develop autonomy and confidence - one of the core goals of education.

Crocus Planting at Kirkby Schools!

Ashfield District Council and Kirkby Rotary Club have been working together to highlight Rotary international's 'Eradicate Polio' campaign.



To raise awareness of the continuing fight against the disease that still affects parts of the developing world, purple crocus bulbs have been planted by pupils at

Kirkby's Morven Park School. The planting took place on October 22nd to coincide with the international Eradicate Polio Day from funding provided by the Council. The ADC Corporate

Communications Manager issued a news release and photograph to local media.

Rotarian Paul Riley, President of Kirkby-in-Ashfield Rotary Club, said: "Rotary has been involved in the eradication of polio for around thirty years and the end is now in sight. We are delighted that Ashfield District Council has supported us by supplying the bulbs for the children of Morven Park School to plant today."

At the same time, the Council themselves planted several thousand of the purple crocus bulbs in Morven Park next to the school. In November more were being planted by pupils at Kingsway and Orchard Primary Schools in Kirkby, and the Rotary Club were raising funds by selling crocus badges and bags of bulbs.

Long Eaton Interactors fundraising will benefit almost 3,000 children!

increased threefold in value by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Initiative, this will enable almost 3,000 children to receive the polio vaccine and benefit from this fundraising.

Interact President Katie Breakwell handed over the cheque to RTN Albert Ripamonti who said although recent conflicts have made the task of ridding the world of Polio so much harder with the spread of the disease. There have been no new cases of polio in Africa since last year. He also said he was very impressed with the fundraising the students had undertaken and that by working together we would make a difference and help with the eradication of polio.

End Polio - Schools help Rotary Club to fight Polio



The Doncaster St Leger Club has focused for the last few years on the 'Purple Pinkie Power' project planting thousands of purple crocuses inspired by the dab

of colour on a child's finger indicating that the child has been inoculated against the deadly virus.

This year the four participating schools were Hexthorpe Primary, Pheasant Bank Primary Academy, Town Field Primary and Heatherwood Special School. Staff and school governors participated in the planting days and in addition the Friends of Sandall Park committed to planting crocuses in the park; the crocuses were planted adjacent to new fencing co-funded with the club, sponsored by a District Grant and bearing the Rotary logo.

The schools were shown a PowerPoint presentation on Polio and supplied with posters, brochures, support notes, collecting cans, purple stamp pads - and crocuses. Each school ran an 'End Polio' 'name the End Polio bear' competition. Crocuses were planted in open spaces, raised beds and in pots for class rooms and for sale. One school created a new raised bed for the purpose, another packed crocuses into specially made purple boxes to sell and a third created special posters. A local garden supplier donated compost and a supermarket is to give us space for an End Polio collection.

Other speakers with topics relevant to Rotary all spoke with sincerity and passion. The two breakout groups went down very well, with an exceptionally large attendance at the Media Session. The entertainment, from Rtn Paul Hopkins and his Wilburys Tribute Band, through Maxine Molin-Rose on her harp to That'll be the Day all provided excellent value for money.

Music in the Gardens

How fortunate we are in Sheffield to have the wonderful Botanical Gardens situated so near to the city centre - an oasis of tranquillity in a modern vibrant city. Designed and built for the Sheffield Botanical and Horticultural Society in 1836 by the famous Scottish horticulturalist, Robert Marnock, its ownership was taken over by the Sheffield Town Trust at the end of the 19th century, thus giving free entry to everyone.



The Gardens were the subject of a major renovation project in the early years of the current century costing £6.69m., funded in the main by the Heritage Lottery Fund. On completion of the renovation project the Gardens Curator was tasked with bring added attractions to the Gardens - e.g. open air theatre, art and music.



Thus in 2006 when some Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Sheffield came up with the idea of concerts in the Gardens, the Curator willingly accepted their offer to organise such events. Originally called "Jazz in the Gardens" the first concert held over 2 nights was a great success. It was repeated the following year, and by now the Rotary Club of Sheffield found it had a winner in its hands and in 2008 other Rotary Clubs in the Sheffield area were invited to become involved; the name was changed to "Music in the Gardens"; and it became a 4-day musical extravaganza bringing in well known artistes from different genres of music.

Music in the Gardens certainly adds to the amenities in the Botanical Gardens, but at the same time all the profits made on the event are distributed to charities, most of which have a local connection



2015 was a special year for Music in the Gardens, its 10th Anniversary. The event took place in early July with performances from Paul Carrack, Lindisfarne, The Proclaimers and on the Sunday evening "Last Night in the Gardens" with the Unite the Union Brass Band and the Sheffield Philharmonic Orchestra, finishing the whole event with a spectacular firework display.



This year around 130 Rotarians were involved in the event one way or another from 13 South Yorkshire/North Derbyshire Clubs and over £50,000 was raised for both local and national charities, with £4,500 being donated to our own Rotary Foundation.

This year's main charities included Edale Mountain Rescue, Marie Curie Cancer Care, Diabetes UK, Sheffield Home-Start Crohn's and Colitis, Stroke Association, Pilgrim Bandits and an environmental charity, Portland Works. Added to this each of the participating Clubs received a donation to their Trust Funds for smaller donations to the charities of their choice.

D.G. Roger attended the Last Night at the Gardens and again at our Presentation Evening and he was so impressed with the whole venture, now probably the largest event run by Rotary in the U.K.

Music in the Gardens has grown in status over 10 years and is now a part of the summer scene in the City. It is a great sight to see people sitting on their seats and rugs eating their picnic, enjoying a glass (or two) of wine whilst listening to music on a nice summer's evening.

Do come and join us next year - 30th June to 3rd July - details to follow.

District Governor's Message

Wow, to quote the old adage "doesn't time fly". I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Presidents and members of the clubs visited for their warmth of welcome and hospitality I received during each visit.

As you will be aware 4 additional clubs joined our District at the beginning of this Rotary year: Abbeydale, Buxton, Doncaster St. Leger and Sheffield, all of whom have proved to be a great asset to the District. At the conclusion of this Rotary year District 1270 will sadly be disbanded. In the company of the District Governor Elect and District Secretary I chaired a cluster meeting comprised of the 13 clubs, each of whom had indicated their wish to join District 1220 at the beginning of the next Rotary year. It has been agreed to accept these clubs into our district at the end of this Rotary year, subject to the approval of Rotary International.

My first social engagement as DG was to visit Music in the Gardens in Sheffield Botanical Gardens. This has now become an annual 3 night musical extravaganza, the event organised and facilitated by Abbeydale, Dronfield, Drone Valley, Eckington, Rotherham, Rotherham Sitwell, Sheffield and Wortley. Jasvinda Sanghera, OBE, a survivor of a forced marriage and honour-based abuse gave a moving and thought provoking presentation. The entertainment programme was second to none, catering for all tastes. For the first time this year in addition to the long established Golf Tournament, a tenpin bowling competition took place. I sincerely thank Conference Director Dave Ashley and all the members of the Conference Team for making this year's District Conference such a success.

November is the month when the nation pays tribute to the men and women who lost their lives as a result of the conflict of war. Past District Governor Val Leivers and I attended the Royal British Legion Nottinghamshire County 2015 Poppy Launch at Rufford Abbey Country Park. The Poppy Appeal has now been adopted as an official RIBI project thanks to the lead of this District. Last year we filled over 480 2-hour slots in the City of Nottingham and Arnold alone and a great deal of



publicity was generated for Rotary. I was out with Past District Governor Val and the Lord Mayor of Nottingham selling poppies in the City and later with the Sherriff of Nottingham on a similar venture.

Along with my own club, Amber Valley, we attended a unique charity dinner on the eve of Remembrance Sunday in the shadow of that iconic aircraft the Vulcan which is housed in Vulcan Hangar 3 at Robin Hood airport, Doncaster. This occasion was superbly organised by President Graham Higgins and the members of the Rotary Club of Doncaster. The guest speaker was John Hutchinson, ex Concorde pilot and the evening generated a substantial sum of money which will swell the clubs charity coffers.

The time is fast approaching when many clubs are busy preparing for their Christmas festive season; Santa and his sleigh will be observed in numerous locations throughout the District. I wish you every success in your seasonal endeavours. As we journey through this year, let's remind ourselves of this year's Rotary International theme "Be a Gift to the World" and whenever and wherever try to embrace it in our Rotary thoughts, words and deeds.

In conclusion, Pauline and I would like to take this opportunity to wish you and your families a Very Happy Christmas and a Healthy New Year.

We were greeted into the centre of Paris, Place de Concorde, by family, friends and colleagues where we then enjoyed a satisfying BBQ accompanied by Champagne. After an hour of enjoying food, drink and photos, we cycled along the cobbled Champs d'Elysees up to and twice around the Arc d'Triumph, cycling through all red lights and holding up the centre of ParisMagnifique!

The overall ride has so far collected £39k towards Bornehjertefonden - Denmark's Children's Heart Hospital, £25k towards International and local community projects plus Tony has raised £1150 towards local Derby charities Treetops Hospice and Erewash CVS.

Three Peaks Challenge

In 2014, following treatment for cancer and suddenly faced with my own mortality, I felt the need to live my life more fully whilst also making a difference for others. Being totally blind, I was more than thrilled when I was made aware of a fundraising challenge to climb our nations' three highest peaks - Mount Snowden, Scafell Pike & Ben Nevis. This challenge was to raise funds for medical research into Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP), the cause of my blindness.

I found myself on a sunny July day travelling to my first climb. Son Wes had kindly offered to act as my sighted guide for the week to come. Mount Snowden was marred by perpetual rain, but, with the promise of a dry cafeteria at the summit, we marched on. However, the weather was so grim that the cafe had abandoned their post to stay dry and warm at home! Scafell Pike, a relatively easy climb until we encountered tricky river crossings - but worse was to come! Boulder fields were dangerous which, along with loose scree at the summit, proved to be the most difficult and exhausting aspect of the whole week. Some eight hours later we collapsed back at our hotel for a hot bath and a cold beer! Our final climb the mighty Ben Nevis. Up the foothills onto a steep zig zag path, we eventually emerged into a snow plateau! At least we were lucky - the previous week it had been minus 5c but now it was only a sub-tropical zero. Snow angels were compulsory before trudging onwards and upwards to the summit where I am told the views were tremendous! The Three Peaks Challenge done! Together we hoped to raise a total of £3,000 for RP. Through the generosity of family, friends, Rotary Clubs and individual Rotarians I am thrilled to report that by September 2015 we had raised almost £7.000! I was honoured with a Paul Harris Fellowship at our Club Charter and subsequently the District Endeavour Shield for 2015 - all this recognition for simply walking 30 miles and elevating myself 10,000ft!

In 1740 Elizabeth Turner established a Trust and left 48 acres of land and her cottage in Swanwick, to create a school for 'poor' boys and girls of the locality. Local charity, Valley CIDS, now oversees the farm and is investing heavily to bring it back to life. The decay has successfully been stopped and buildings have been brought back from near dereliction and repaired. The project needed some help and over several days, Rotary volunteers worked to clear away overgrown vegetation and with the help of local expert, Angus Sterland and his tractor, drove in gate posts and fence posts, hung gates and stapled in stock resistant wire fencing to make the pens.

The aim is to make Turner's Farm a centre for aspiration, education and recreation; this will carry on Elizabeth Turner's original vision of giving young people the opportunity to get the best start in life. And rew Loades

The first phase of the work has now commenced, with fencing outside and a stoned carpark. Currently the building has been rewired, a new heating system & lighting has been installed, a suspended ceiling is in place & additional toilets provided.

The work is ongoing and there is still a long way to go, but from a draughty old industrial workshop, a new centre for youth and community is starting to emerge.

Frustrated with organising street collections?



RotaRota is a brand new, easy to use service that I have developed that allows charities, churches, youth groups, sporting clubs and other organisations to get commitment to help from their volunteers. As an Organiser you can easily create a Campaign, with Events and Activities, then share a simple link and Passkey with your community and have them self-register to take part. It takes away the endless phone calls, email circulars and double-bookings and allows people to put their name down to help when it is easy and convenient for them to do so A Campaign could be a sequence of events for which you need volunteers such as a weekend collection at a supermarket. You share the details of the Campaign with your Volunteers, and when they access the RotaRota website they see all the events they can sign up for in one screen. Depending on the nature of your Event, and its length, it's possible that you will need to break the event down into several periods of time; you may decide that a collector or volunteer should not work for more than 2 hours.

Activities are the actual duties that your volunteers will perform. You can create as many activities as required, each with its own name. Later, volunteers will put their names against the individual activities Once you have the Events in place with Shifts and Activities, you can launch your Campaign. All you need to do is just pass on the link and the Passkey to access your Campaign. Volunteers do not need to create an account, they can just follow the link you give them and enter their names in available Activities.
