ROTARY CLUB OF HOPE VALLEY WINS THE RIBI 2011/12 RODNEY HUGGINS 'ENVIRONMENTAL CLUB AWARD'

Members from the Rotary Clubs of Hope Valley and Matlock were recently privileged to meet RIBI President Ray Burman when he presented Hope Valley's President with the RIBI 2011/12 Rodney Huggins Environmental Club Award for Hope Valley's 'Re-cycling 4 Africa, cycles 2 India' project. This project involved both sourcing and financing the shipment of 500 used bikes to deserving communities in Africa and disabled people in India. The award was backed up with a cheque to help Hope Valley Rotarians continue their work to source a further 100 bicycles and finance their shipment to schoolchildren in Africa before the end of this Rotary year.

During the past year the Clubs have been working together with Hope Valley collecting and storing the bicycles whilst Matlock's International Committee's fundraising initiatives financed shipment of a batch of 101 bicycles. These bicycles were recently despatched to Jole Rider for final refurbishment prior to their despatch to the Gambia. Our Club have now concluded another stage in our bicycles project as we collected another tranche of bicycles from 'donors' in villages all around North Derbyshire. The bicycles will be accompanied by a £1,500 cheque to Jole Rider, to finance Jole Rider's shipment of a further 100 bicycles to Africa.

Hope Valley first started collecting bicycles for renovation and subsequent despatch to Africa and India in December 2006. Approximately 400 refurbished bicycles have been sent to Africa, for use by children and teenagers, who live too far from a school to walk to their place of education. The 100 bicycles sent to India were shipped out in an un-refurbished state for conversion by trained personnel into outdoor wheelchairs. The bicycles were rescued from being neglected, broken, scrapped or being thought of as 'too old' or 'out of fashion'. Their refurbishment and subsequent re-use has positive benefits to the environment, and has maximised and extended the life of the bicycles.

International Committee Chair Les Lennon organised the collection of the bicycles from towns and villages in North Derbyshire and the bicycles are stored in Rtn Ian Charles' warehouse. Ian devised a means of storing books in voids in the containers used to ship the bicycles, for distribution to schoolchildren in Africa. This idea has now been adopted by the Charity Jole Rider, which ships the bicycles to Africa.

CHILDREN OF COURAGE AWARDS

The Rotary Children of Courage Awards Event was the brain child of the Mansfield Rotary Club in Ohio and brought back to Mansfield, Nottinghamshire about 20 years ago. The event aims to honour young people of secondary school age who have shown great courage in overcoming personal difficulties in their lives. This year Dave Strange of the Newark Castle Rotary Club, working with Denis Power-Neads of the Newark Rotary Club, organised the event for the first time to honour young people in the Newark area.

An Awards Lunch took place at the Holy Trinity Centre in Newark on Monday March 19th and was attended by over 90 people. Special guests included the Chairman of Newark and Sherwood District, Councillor Marika Tribe and Newark Town Mayor and Mayoress, Councillor Bryan Richardson and Penelope Richardson.

The five young people nominated for the awards were Nathan Roberts of the Grove School, Emma Scott of the Magnus C of E School, Liam Marley of Newark College, William Telfer of the Orchard School and Kaisha Palmer of the Tuxford School. Each student exemplified the courage required in the face of personal adversity and difficulty. After being introduced by a member of staff from their school or college, they each received an engraved award and framed certificate presented by District Governor Gordon McGlone.

You could not help but be moved by this emotional and humbling event, honouring five worthy recipients. It is hoped that this will become an annual event to include even more courageous young people from a wider area.

NEW MEMBERSHIP INITIATIVE THROUGH SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

A small group of officers from the District Membership and Marketing committees for 2012/13 have conceived an idea that will hopefully assist clubs in developing new member opportunities. The idea is to put business at the heart of Rotary rather than trying to identify prospective new members from the business community which proves difficult when those links no longer exist.





The idea is beyond its conceptual stage and we are already planning meetings with significant businesses in our area that will enable us to create a working model that can be used by any club.

Some companies already have sustainability as a part of their corporate responsibility. This should include an element of social responsibility that can transcend into community service which itself offers employees an opportunity for personal development. Rotary is already working in the community and is able to identify projects that would be ideal for employers to engage selected employees upon as a part of their career development, working with clubs on defined projects in the community. We are looking to promote Rotary as a broker service between groups of young business people and the community. We are proposing that they become a part of Rotary through the Associate membership scheme or a similar arrangement. They are then introduced into Rotary through the strong links established with the managing club thus bridging that gap between Rotary and the business community.





The idea received encouraging support when it was introduced at District Assembly and it is our intention to keep you all informed of progress over the coming months. However, anybody wishing to know more should contact me.

FISHTAIL FUND

A chance meeting of two Rotarians from across the world has been the inspiration for a flourishing project initiated by the Rotary Club of Dronfield which has attracted support from clubs and individuals throughout District 1220.

The story begins in 2008 when Dronfield Rotarian David Lumb was travelling in Nepal and met Binod Koirala, then President of the local Rotary Club of Pokhara Fishtail. They realised that between them they could make a difference: the local club by choosing and monitoring suitable students and Dronfield by generating interest and support in the UK. Since then Rotarians have kept in touch by internet and by personal travel: David has visited Pokhara again, and four Rotarians from Nepal came over, at their own expense, to make an inspiring presentation at the 2011 District 1220 Scarborough Conference which led to a surge in sponsorship donations.

"Fishtail" refers to the majestic mountain which rears up behind the town; called Machapuchre in Nepali, it is sacred and has never been climbed. The Fishtail Fund supports poor but clever children in Nepal, helping them to resist economic pressures on them to leave school early. The Fund has swelled from an initial intake of 10 students in 2009 to almost fifty today. Each student is helped with a modest £60 a year to stay in education; the money goes on warm clothes, stationery, textbooks and examination fees

Surva Lamsal is 12, in Grade 7 at Secondary School in Pokhara. There are two other children in the family and his parents both work as unskilled labourers; all five family members live in a rented room. Surya's application read ... my family's economic condition does not support me to fulfil my desire to be a doctor in future... His school recommended Surya for a scholarship, his head teacher writing - Surya is very disciplinary and hardworking. He got 2nd position in his last exam and this year he was top of the class!

His Head Teacher will pay all his school expenses and give the remaining Fishtail grant to the family for uniforms and stationery. Surya's supporters in D1220 receive annual upgrades on his progress: exam results, photographs, school reports and often a personal letter.

The Fishtail Fund is currently seeking support for the students at college level and beyond. There are further $\bar{\text{d}}\textsc{e}\textsc{tails}$ at www.fishtailfund.com. Speakers will be delighted to come to your club to tell you more about Nepal and the fund. The Trustees in Dronfield thank all clubs, individuals and organisations who have supported them so far.



The District Governors will meet as the District Governors Forum and will be able to give more of their time to District matters while still having influence on the Board as well as scrutinising their actions.

During the next Rotary year the 2012/13 District Governors will form the last General Council of RIBI and working with the constitutions committee will finalise the powers and responsibilities of the new structure.
