Rotary continues to be at the forefront at providing support both from financial and by physical endeavours to the areas mainly in Cumbria, North and West Yorkshire devastated by unprecedented floods. These are just two of the headline hitting incidents where Rotary's collaborative efforts are active. In the Rotary year (2014/2015) we lost over 1000 members which have not been replaced, the increasing age demographics, RIBI has the highest age profile in the Rotary world, 76 years on average.
